Welcome to Les Baux-de-Provence!

My name is 'Star', the little sheep, and I'm delighted to help you discover my village and its secrets.

During your visit, you'll discover a village listed as one of the 'Most Beautiful Villages in France', with its historic monuments and above all, its imposing medieval fortress.

In the heart of the Alpilles mountain range, Les Baux de Provence is a village perched on a rocky spur.

The Santons Museum



A santon is a small figurine made of clay.

The Shepherding Ceremony takes place at Christmas during the midnight mass. It represents the offering of the last lamb born, by the shepherds. We're going to start our tour in the Museum of Santons.* Move towards the large display case showing the Shepherding Ceremony.***

Look for the unusual animal that you can't find in France.



The Constable's House



The constable's role was to lead the army and settle problems between knights or nobles.



On leaving the museum, find the Constable's House.* This is the house with the basket of flowers above the door.

5 words related to the word 'Constable' are found in this word search. Help yourself with the clues.




Eyguières Gate



In days gone by, the villagers would go down through this gate to the Vallon de la Fontaine, in search of "... "?

But why is it called this?




Troglodyte dwellings



A troglodytic dwelling is a house dug into the rock.

If you exit through this gate, you can see the remains of ancient troglodyte dwellings at the entrance to the village.

Hôtel de Porcelet


You can then walk up the Rue de la Calade towards Saint Vincent's Church Square. Just before the church, it is the Hôtel de Porcelet (now home to the Yves Brayer Museum).

Saint-Vincent's Church

In 1642, Louis XIII gave the seigneury of Les Baux to the Prince of Monaco in gratitude. Although the family lost its lands during the French Revolution, the title of Marquis des Baux is now held by Prince Jacques.



Now enter the church and look for the little cart, the one where the lamb is placed during the Pastrage's ceremony at midnight mass.

Look at the stained glass windows. Who donated them? Guess the charade and find out!

Chapel of the White Penitents




The fresco depicts the Shepherds' Christmas.


Then you can exit and walk across the square to the Chapel of the White Penitents.

Vallon de la Fontaine



Once outside, head towards the low wall and admire the beautiful view over the Vallon de la Fontaine.

And if you look to your left in the rock, you'll see the ancient cistern of Les Baux.

Entrance to the Château

After the birth of Jesus, the Magi King Balthazar continued his journey, following a star that led him to Les Baux-de-Provence.


His descendants are proud of this story and place a sixteen-pointed star on their coat of arms, with the motto "à l'asard Bautezar", meaning "at random Balthazar"..

The mosaic star is created by the artist Marie Tramond Caromi


Go back down the rue du Trencat. On your left is the entrance to the courtyard where you can see the work of the stonemasons (Place Prince Rainier III de Monaco).

Hôtel de Manville

Now, come and stand in front of the Hôtel de Manville (the town hall). Can you see the 4 flags hanging from the façade? Match each flag with its corresponding name.



Tourist Office



This rock is called "bauxite".
It's named after the village of Les Bauxde-Provence, where the rock was first discovered in 1821.

You can now go back down to the Tourist Office. In front of the entrance is a rock called "The bauxite".

Circle the material made from this rock.



On leaving the village



In winter, you stand in front of it to keep warm, and the heat is produced by the fire.



The name Baux comes from the Provençal term "baou" meaning a steep, rocky spur.


